The Spring Retreats begun by former President Renee Minarik have continued with great success. In 2022 the Retreat took place on beautiful Lake Chautauqua in Jamestown, New York, home to Lucille Ball, the national comedy museum, and District 2 Director's father Norman. This year's May retreat was held in Saratoga Springs, NY, and NAWJ judges were recognized on the floor of the New York State Assembly and invited to meet with Governor Hochul! NYC's Deputy Chief Admin. Judge for Justice Initiatives Edwina Richardson-Mendelson joined as well!

District 2 Judges Leslie Stroth, Carmen Velasquez and Kathy King represented NAWJ at the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women Conference where NAWJ member Salwar Kader honored Judge Rona Sabawoon and other Afghan women at her event, "Let girls & women have access to education." The honorees gave chilling accounts of the plight of women.

District 2 co-sponsored "Build and Grow", at Brooklyn law school, a bar to bench networking event attended by several NAWJ Judges, attorneys and law students, with Corporation Counsel Sylvia Hinds-Radix (NAWJ member) giving the keynote speech.

District 2 held the most well-attended Color of Justice Program yet with Monroe College in the Bronx (130 local high school students attended). ABA President Deborah Enix-Ross moderated, and a panel of esteemed judges and lawyers discussed their paths to the legal profession and the bench during an interactive presentation with the students.
