Eric Helland holds the William F. Podlich Professorship in Economics and is a George R. Roberts Fellow at Claremont McKenna College. He also serves as a senior economist at RAND's Institute for Civil Justice and co-directs the CMC Policy Lab. He has authored over 50 books and articles on law and economics. His current research focuses on access to justice, the judiciary, and mass litigation.

In 2002-03, he was a visiting fellow at the Stigler Center for the Study of the Economy and the State at the University of Chicago Graduate School of Business. In 2003-04, he served as a senior economist on President George W. Bush's Council of Economic Advisers. In 2008, he was a visiting professor of law at the University of California, Los Angeles. In 2011-12, he was a visiting scholar at USC's Schaeffer Center for Health Policy and Economics. He served as president of the Society for Empirical Legal Studies from 2018 to 2022 and is currently a Fellow of the Society for Empirical Legal Studies.

Helland has taught empirical methods and law and economics at the Antonin Scalia Law School at George Mason University, the Claremont Graduate University, and The Buchmann Faculty of Law at Tel Aviv University. He co-edited the International Review of Law and Economics from 2011 to 2022 and serves on the editorial board of the Journal of Law and Empirical Analysis. He was also a member of the California Bar Association's Closing the Justice Gap Working Group. He holds a B.A. in Economics with honors and a minor in Mathematics from the University of Missouri-Columbia, as well as an M.A. and Ph.D. in Economics from Washington University in St. Louis.

His articles have been published in scholarly journals such as the *Stanford Law Review*, the *Georgetown Law Review*, the *Journal of Empirical Legal Studies*, the *Journal of Law and Economics Review*, the *Journal of Law, Economics and Organization*, the *Journal of Law and Economics*, and the *Review of Economics and Statistics*.
